

Report from ICWES Business Meeting

The international delegates to the VIIth International Conference of Women Engineers and Scientists met at the Shoreham Hotel, Washington, D.C. on Wednesday, June 22, 1984. The meeting was called to order by the Chair, Naomi AcAfee at 1 pm.

The Chair reported there were 54 international delegates representing 15 countries at the conference. There were over 1200 registrants total.

Two items of business arose: 1) the location of the next ICWES and 2) the approval of conference guidelines.

The Ivory Coast delegation proposed to hold the VIIIth ICWES in Abidjan, Ivory Coast the latter half of July, 1987. This offer was accepted contingent upon the Ivory Coast delegation submitting a written proposal describing the exact date, description of facilities, accomodations, comparative current costs, plans, government/ associations support, etc. to the VIIth ICWES Chair no later than 1 December, 1984. If this was not done the United Kingdom delegate offered to host the VIIIth ICWES in 1988. However, the United Kingdom would prefer to host the IXth ICWES in 1990.

It was stressed that any host country which does not have English as its major language must provide translation facilities as most of the papers will be presented in English.

The second order of business was the approval of "Guidelines for the International Conference of Women Engineers and Scientists (ICWES)." These were a consolidation of the Rouen Guidelines, the Bombay Minutes and some minor current updating. These were to be implemented immediately upon approval. A significant feature is the formation of the ICWES Continuity Committee (ICC). The ICC consists of a Convener (someone other than the current ICWES Chair) and 11 world area representatives.
